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With one of the care receivers I often accompany her and her daughter for an evening meal at a local Restaurant – to continue to help the care receiver with daily living tasks.

Specialist tasks – I do provide assistance with eye drops and ear drops occasionally, having had the necessary training from the District Nurse.

Communication and involvement

When I began working with each my care receivers, I discussed their individual support needs and reached agreement about what I would do, and what I wouldn't do. I keep a daily record of the support I provide. One care receiver always reads the record I keep and joins in a discussion with her son to review our agreement, about once a month.

The other care receiver is not able to participate in her care records and review in the same way (because of a diagnosis of Dementia) but these are discussed regularly with her daughter.

Rights and responsibilities

I ensure that all information received in the course of carrying out my duties is treated with the utmost confidentiality and is not passed to any unauthorised persons. Records are accurate and fit for purpose. I am always respectful of the care receiver's personal privacy and space.
